He also wants to know of the place from where God has brought the fire burning in the tiger's eyes. He is also curious to know how the brain and the heart of the tiger were created. Such was the power of the tiger ~~not~~ even the heavenly bodies surrendered before it. They have the capacity of watering the step with tears. Such is the power of creativity and the glory of His creation that surprises the poet that the innocent lamb and the fearful tiger live together. It was a difficult job ~~before~~ God to bring the fire of the eyes of the tiger from the bottom of some sea. It was also a difficult job for him
